exploring the language of poems plays and prose examines how readers interact with literary works how they understand and are moved by them mick short considers how meanings and effects are generated in the three major literary genres carrying out stylistic analysis of poetry drama and prose fiction in turn he analyses a wide range of extracts from english literature adopting an accessible approach to the analysis of literary texts which can be applied easily to other texts in english and in other languages

the aim of this book is to explain style in terms which do not presuppose too extensive an acquaintance on the part of the reader with linguistic terminology its orientation is not basically theoretical it attempts to provide help in a pragmatic way for those who recognize the importance of language in literature but who do not know where to start or how to exploit the particular knowledge and skills they possess

practical approaches to literary stylistics are demonstrated through analysis of examples of prose fiction poetry and drama

people in plays other texts explores how the words of a text create a particular impression of a character in the reader s mind drawing together theories from linguistics social cognition and literary stylistics it is the first book length study to focus on the role of language and characterisation characterisation in the dialogue of play texts containing numerous examples from shakespeare s plays the book also considers a wide range of other genres including prose fiction verse films advertisements jokes and newspapers language and characterisation is as practical as it is theoretical and equips readers with analytical frameworks to reveal and explain both the cognitive and the linguistic sides of characterisation clear and detailed introductions are given to the theories and useful suggestions for further analysis are also made at the end of each part of the book the book will be essential reading for students and researchers of language literature and communication

language in literature examines the overlap and blurring boundaries of english comparative and world poetry and literature questions of language literature translation and creative writing are addressed as befitting an author who is a poet literary scholar and historian the book begins with metaphor which aristotle thought in poetics was the key gift of the poet and discusses it in theory and practice it moves from the identity of metaphor to identity in translation and culture it examines poetry in a comparative and world context it looks at image and text it explores literature and culture in the cold war it explores the role of the poet and scholar in translating poetry east and west it places creative writing in theory and practice in context east and west it concludes by summing up and suggesting implications of creation in language translating and interpreting its expression in literature especially in poetry

covering the skills and knowledge required by a level english language syllabuses this is an essentially practical text it provides information ideas and background theory which students should be able to access effectively and enjoy via activities and investigations this text aims to enable students to read and listen in a linguistically informed manner and to develop their own writing and speaking abilities with emphasis on the student s own experience of language the many group and individual activities lift the theory from the page and stimulate integrated productive and analytical work the activities suggest ways of applying linguistic knowledge to texts and data and are designed to prepare students for examination papers and to generate quality course work both literary and non literary texts are featured

language literature and the learner is an edited volume evolving from three international seminars devoted to the teaching of literature in a second or foreign language the seminars explicitly addressed the interface between language and literature teaching
